Health & Wellness Center

Dr. David Rubenstein, Psy.D.

Executive Director, Health & Wellness Center

Executive Director position is a new position on campus

- Designed to think about how to promote health and wellness (H&W) across the entire university campus
- Lehigh is very interested in how to put H&W at the forefront of campus culture
- Seeing the impact of stress and mental/physical health issues on UG and Grad students

Dr. Rubenstein has been here for five months so far

- How to integrate counseling, medical services, education services, and more
- How faculty and administration can hold the importance of H&W across the university
- Faculty have an obligation to integrate H&W into their classroom experience

Has focused so far primarily on H&W center and services

- Hiring new staff
- Updating procedures
- Also making updates to Johnson Hall
 - H&W is on the third floor
 - Long term, University thinking about a central space for H&W

H&W center has:

- Primary care setup
 - Medical assistance
 - Nurses and Nurse Practitioners

- Physicians
- Can schedule by phone, online through the portal, or walk-in
 - Scheduling online: can only schedule up to a **week in advance**
 - This is intentional because many students wait to get help until they're deep into illness
 - If you don't see appointment online, **call** the center to see if they have appointment that day (they leave certain number of appointments per day for walk-ins or sudden emergencies)
- Often will see nurse first, who can treat to completion
 - If nurse can't, then see a provider for services
 - Most services are free (a few tests with charges)
 - 95% of what is offered is free (i.e. no copay or deductible)
- M-W 8:15-4:45 (clinical time)
- Not open during evenings or weekends at the moment
 - Considering at least some evenings or weekend mornings
 - Specifically helps graduate students
- Can do various tests or labs (timeline from same-day to a few days)
 - Connected to Lehigh Valley Hospital, St. Luke's, etc.
 - No radiology (i.e. MRIs, X-Ray, etc.)

Questions?

Someone emphasizes free over-the-counter medication

Come in, don't delay! If you have a concern, stop in *immediately*

Will the newer space be on a lower, flatter part of campus that are more central and more accessible?

- This is all being taken into account about the decision
- Next steps: meet with architects to discuss plans

Dr. Rubenstein has recovered a few spaces right in front of Johnson Hall

- Let them know you've driven and parked and the center will give you a Lehigh parking pass
- There is an elevator, albeit an outdated one

Are there any campaigns that are being thought about to change the culture of H&W on campus?

- STI clinics offered once a semester
 - Should be offered on a weekly basis!
- Dr. R has set up liaisons that interface with the pride center, the gender violence education and support office to do joint programming, Health Advancement and Prevention Strategies
 - Medical professionals should be getting training on LGBTQIA+ health needs

- Workings with GVES to promote competency in gender violence issues
- Wants to increase work with the counseling center to have more access and seamless collaboration
- Thinking about intentional campaigns for alcohol and drug policies and initiatives
- Met with B&W publication often
- Gave out more flu shots than ever before at Lehigh; more than a 1,000 shots this year

Interviewing for a new physician position

- Hired Nurse Practitioner, office coordinator, front office staff
- Pushing for budget to hire for another nurse and make more time for students

What does integrated care look like in this vision at Lehigh?

- One thing H&W center is going to start this semester is screen for both mental health and drug and alcohol issues any time students enter the center
 - Catches students who may be struggling and don't want to report
- Mental health provider in primary care practice as *part* of the H&W center
- Make sure there's a trained professional in the center to address immediate issues of stress, etc.
 - Saves time for folks waiting and takes some burden off physicians and NPs who may not be trained
- Share electronic health records between spaces so they only have to submit history once and all professionals have immediate access and communication

Massage chairs were removed. Disappointment to lose this.

- Was a good relaxing space
- This seems to convey more administrative focus versus student focus
- Replaced chairs that do not have more fabric (need them more comfortable and cleanable; need to hold more students)
- Lounge used to have a large sectional couch that made it difficult to seat many people
- Allows more programming and training for healthcare needs
- Until getting more space, looking to second floor and seeing if those massage chairs and spaces can be fitted

Will the expansion of appointments also consider tests and labs for things like TB?

- Dr. R might try to design specific grad student hours and locations for services
- CoE students need to get TB tests every year, so making flexibility for that at the opening of the year
- Can tests be offered up at Mountaintop instead of making students come down?
 - Knowing where in summer to provide other locations to provide services
- **Email Dr. Rubenstein if you miss a clinic time, and they'll figure out a**

- way to make it up! dar719@lehigh.edu

H&W staff has done things a certain way for a long time

- With new staff and culture, they're working on more flexible and accommodating experiences
- Let Dr. R know if there are inflexible or less positive experiences

Do you notice differences in needs between UG and Grad students at Counseling center and H&W center

- Lot of doctoral students in late 20s, early 30s
- HAPS has not been able to reach out to consider older students
- Psychosocial stressors are vastly different for Grad students versus UG; need programs to address these nuances
 - For example, balancing academic demands with finance and future

SUNY PRODiG Fellowship Application

Promoting Recruitment, Opportunity, Diversity, Inclusion and Growth across the SUNY Comprehensive Sector

The Comprehensive Colleges of the State University of New York system (SUNY) invite applications for the PRODiG Pre/Post-Doctoral Fellowship. The **SUNY PRODiG Fellowship Consortia** represents a collaborative effort of the thirteen comprehensive colleges in the SUNY system (see below). Eligible candidates for this two-year program include late-stage ABDs or post-docs who are underrepresented minorities faculty in general and women faculty of all races in STEM fields.

The focus of the collaborative is to introduce early-career diverse faculty to opportunities at a comprehensive college, and will provide outstanding mentorship and support to increase future success and retention as faculty. The program will provide intentional support toward degree completion, teaching experience in the individual's field of expertise, and faculty development at one of the SUNY comprehensive colleges.

PRODiG Fellows will receive a two-year non-renewable contract, travel allowances, summer research stipends, moving expenses, and reduced teaching load. Annual compensation is competitive. Fellows will be paired with a campus senior faculty member to help facilitate integration and support, and will be a part of a larger cohort of PRODiG Fellows across the SUNY system who will meet (both face-to-face and virtually) throughout the two-year fellowship. The fellowship is open to a wide range of fields.

Applicants must be enrolled in an accredited doctoral program in the U.S. or have completed an accredited doctoral program, and be authorized to work in the U.S. In order to be eligible, the applicant must have an approved dissertation proposal and have advanced to candidate status at their home institution (or have completed their dissertation). Post-doctoral applicants are also encouraged. Successful candidates will show evidence of outstanding academic achievement and promise as teachers and scholars. Candidates should have a capacity to respond in pedagogically productive ways to the learning needs of diverse students attending a comprehensive college.

Applicants should submit a current C.V. and letter of intent describing the applicant's interest in teaching at a comprehensive college; a letter from the dissertation advisor commenting on the applicant's performance, potential, and expected time to degree; and a transcript. Applicants should review the websites below for academic programs and campus locations. Within their letter of intent, applicants should include three to five campus preferences.

Application review will begin January 27 for rolling admissions. Additional information will be provided upon hire, including details on a scheduled retreat in June/July 2020.


